These are the **5 Es of Voting**:

- **Engage** – Become actively involved in your community.
- **Encourage** – Inspire family, friends, and neighbors to vote.
- **Empower** – Equip others with knowledge and confidence.
- **Early Vote** – Make a plan and vote before Election Day.

The Revival of the Vote also strengthens relationships between faith leaders and the communities they serve by creating opportunities for fellowship, worship, education, and civic participation. Through gospel music, prayer, preaching, testimony, youth engagement, and voter education, the movement reaches hearts while equipping minds.

In a time when voter participation is declining and misinformation is increasing, this initiative reminds us that democracy works best when everyone participates. The church remains one of the most trusted institutions in many communities, making it uniquely positioned to encourage informed, nonpartisan civic engagement.
